Legal Experts, Key Stakeholders, and 77% of DC Residents Agree:

Eliminate Mandatory Minimums

By imposing mandatory minimum sentences, courts lose the ability to customize sentences based on individual circumstances and victims' stated goals and preferences.

Mandatory minimum laws do not deter crime, but pressure defendants into plea bargains. Many states have repealed these laws on a bipartisan basis in the past 25 years, and DC was close to eliminating them with the Revised Criminal Code Act.



Mandatory Minimums Do Not Keep Us Safe

- Lengthy prison terms do not improve public safety, nor do they do not reduce recidivism.
- Mandatory minimum sentences can decrease participation in rehabilitative programs.
